

Sailing Instructions
2018 Circuit Regatta #4
June 2 and June 3, 2018
Organizing Authority Fort Worth Boat Club
J/22 Fleet 58 and District 5

1 RULES

- 1.1 The regatta will be governed by the rules as defined in the current *Racing Rules of Sailing* (RRS).
- 1.2 All US SAILING Prescriptions and the U S Prescription in Appendix V will apply.
- 1.3 Rule 87 will be changed to read as follows: *These sailing instructions may change a class rule.*
- 1.4 Class Rule 8.9 (weight limit) of the IJ22CA Class Rules will not apply for eligibility to participate in this Regatta.
- 1.5 Appendix A Changes: A1 is changed so that two (2) races must be completed to constitute an event. A2.1 is changed so that no races shall be discarded.

2 ADVERTISING

- 2.1 Boats may be required to display advertising chosen and supplied by the organizing authority.

3 NOTICES TO COMPETITOR

- 3.1 Notices to competitors and changes to the sailing instructions will be posted on the event web site (www.regattanetwork/event/16XXX) and on the Official Regatta Notice Board on the east window of the FWBC bar.

4 CHANGES TO SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

- 4.1 Any change to the sailing instructions will be posted before 0900 on the day it will take effect, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 2000 on the day before it will take effect.

5 SIGNALS MADE ASHORE

- 5.1 Signals made ashore will be displayed on flagpole near the club office and entrance to the main docks.
- 5.2 When flag AP is displayed ashore, '1 minute' is replaced with 'not less than 60 minutes' in the RRS 'Race Signals'.

6 SCHEDULE

6.1 A total of 5 races are scheduled with an option for a 6th race. The local fleet captain or his/her designee will determine if a 6th race is to be sailed. Two (2) races completed will constitute a regatta.

6.2 On the last day of the regatta no warning signal will be made after 1200.

7 CLASS FLAGS

7.1 The class flag will be a flag with the J/22 logo.

7.2 Boats are not required to fly class flags.

8 RACING AREAS

8.1 All races will be sailed within the confines of Eagle Mountain Lake.

9 CHECKING IN

9.1 Before the warning signal of her first race of each day, each boat shall sail on starboard tack past the stern of the race committee signal boat and hail her bow number until acknowledged by the race committee by repeating the boat's bow number. A boat failing to do so will receive a scoring penalty, without a hearing, equal to 20% of the number of boats starting in that race, calculated as specified in RRS 44.3(c). This modifies Rule 63.1 and A5.

10 THE COURSES

10.1 The courses will be as shown in Attachment A (not to scale).

10.2 No later than the warning signal, the race committee signal boat will display the approximate distance between the leeward and windward marks, and the approximate magnetic bearing of the weather mark.

10.3 The windward mark and offset mark 1a shall be rounded to port.

10.4 An offset mark (1a) will be set at a right angle to the course from Mark 1 to Mark 2s and 2p. Boats shall pass between marks 2s and 2p and round one of them before going to the next mark of the course.

11 MARKS

- 11.1 Rounding marks 1, 2p, and 2s will be yellow tetrahedrons; mark 1a shall be an orange sphere. Changed rounding marks used in accordance with SI 14 will be orange tetrahedrons except for the weather offset mark which shall remain an orange sphere.
- 11.2 A race committee starting or finishing boat may set a stand-off buoy. When present, this stand-off buoy, the line attaching it to the race committee boat, and the race committee boat are all part of the starting or finishing mark.

12 THE START

- 12.1 The starting line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the race committee signal boat and Mark S.
- 12.2 A boat starting later than 10 minutes after her starting signal will be scored Did Not Start without a hearing. This changes RRS A4 and A5.

13 RECALLS

- 13.1 The race committee will attempt to announce boats identified as OCS by transmitting bow numbers over VHF Channel 78. Failure to hear or receive such broadcasts, timeliness of broadcast or the order of numbers announced, will not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS 62.1(a).

14 CHANGE OF THE NEXT LEG OF THE COURSE

- 14.1 To change the next leg of the course, the race committee will lay a new mark (or move the finishing line) and remove the original mark as soon as practicable. When in a subsequent change a new mark is replaced, it will be replaced by an original mark.

15 THE FINISH

- 15.1 The finishing line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on a race committee boat and Mark 1.

16 PENALTY SYSTEM

- 16.1 The penalty system described in 2017-2020 RRS and added as a U S Sailing Prescription Appendix V1 and V2 shall apply.

17 TIME LIMITS

- 17.1 The race will be abandoned if no boat has rounded the first mark within 45 minutes after the start.
- 17.2 The time limit is 2 hours. Boats failing to finish within 20 minutes after the first boat sails the course in accordance with Rule 28.1 and finishes, and not subsequently retiring, penalized or given redress, will be scored DNF without a hearing. This changes RRS 35, A4 and A5.

18 PROTESTS AND REQUESTS FOR REDRESS

- 18.1 Protest forms are available in the Austin Yacht Club clubhouse.. Protests and requests for redress or reopening shall be delivered there within the appropriate time limit.
- 18.2 The protest time limit is 60 minutes after the race committee signal boat docks. The race committee will post the protest time limit on the official notice board referred to in SI 3.1 above.
- 18.3 The race committee will post a list of race committee scoring actions no later than the protest time limit.
- 18.4 Notices of protests by the race committee or protest committee will be posted to inform boats under RRS 61.1(b).
- 18.5 As soon as practicable after the protest time limit, the protest committee will post a notice to inform competitors of the schedule and location of hearings in which they are parties or named as witnesses. Hearings will be held in the SYC clubhouse.
- 18.6 On the last scheduled day of racing, a request for redress based on a jury decision shall be delivered no later than 30 minutes after the decision was posted. This changes rule 62.2.
- 18.7 Any sailor who wishes to become a party to a scheduled redress hearing shall: 1) Check the daily schedule of protest and redress hearings that the protest committee will post on the Official Notice Board describing the nature of the redress request and time of the hearing, and 2) submit a written request to participate in the hearing to the protest committee before the hearing begins. The posting by the protest committee on the Official Notice Board of the notice and time for a redress hearing requested by any boat shall constitute the reasonable attempt of the protest committee to notify all boats in compliance with U S Sailing Prescription (b) to Rule 63.2.

19 SCORING

- 19.1 RRS Appendix A4, Low Point System, will apply.
- 19.2 There are no throw outs for this event.

20 SAFETY REGULATIONS

- 20.1 A boat that retires from a race, or leaves the racing area between races, shall notify the race committee at the first reasonable opportunity by hail or on VHF channel 68.

21 REPLACEMENT OF CREW AND EQUIPMENT

- 21.1 Substitution of skipper or crew will not be allowed without prior written approval of the protest committee. In case of emergency, this approval may be granted retroactively.
- 21.2 Competitors must use the same boat, measured equipment, and only one suit of sails for the entire regatta unless the item is so severely damaged as to make it unusable. All requests to replace equipment must be submitted to the race committee or the protest committee in writing and all such equipment must pass measurement.

22 HAUL-OUT RESTRICTIONS

- 22.1 All boats are to be launched by 1200 HRS on Saturday, June 2nd and once launched may not be hauled out, nor rudders removed, during the Regatta except with and according to the terms of prior written permission from the race committee or protest committee.

23 RADIO COMMUNICATION

- 23.1 Except in an emergency, a boat shall neither make radio transmissions while racing nor receive radio communication not available to all boats. This restriction also applies to mobile telephones. Boats may use mobile phones to record races while racing; however, must not upload data while racing.

24 DIVING EQUIPMENT AND PLASTIC POOLS

- 24.1 Underwater breathing apparatus and plastic pools or their equivalent shall not be used around boats between the preparatory signal of the first race and the end of the regatta.

25 PRIZES

- 25.1 Prizes will be awarded to the top 3 competitors.

26 DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY

- 26.1 Competitors participate in the regatta entirely at their own risk. See RRS 4, Decision to Race. The organizing authority will not accept any liability for material damage or personal injury or death sustained in conjunction with or prior to, during, or after the regatta.

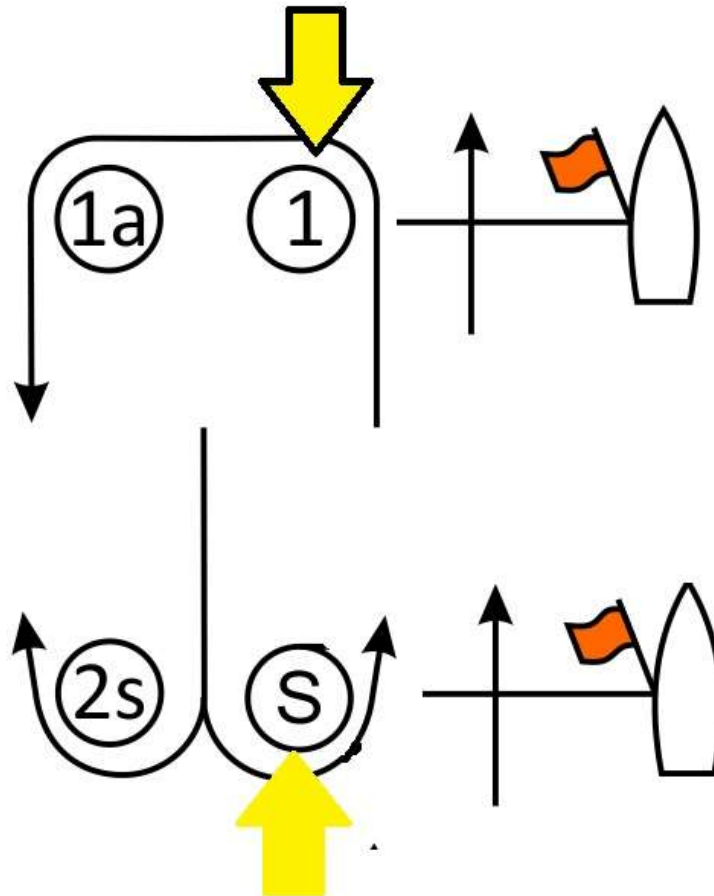
Attachment A

Course Diagram

Course will be windward/leeward with offset and leeward gate:

Start – 1, 1a – 2s/2p – 1, 1a – 2s/2p – Finish

On leg 5, Mark #1 becomes Mark F for the Finish.



The starting pin becomes mark 2p after the starting gun.
