

Lauderdale Yacht Club 2019 Annual Regatta Ocean Course Laser, Laser Radial, 4.7, and Snipe January 26 & 27, 2019

SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

1.0 RULES

- 1.1 This regatta is organized under the authority of the Lauderdale Yacht Club and will be sailed under the management of the Lauderdale Yacht Club Race Committee. The regatta will be governed by the current **Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS)**, the prescriptions of US Sailing except those of rules 63.2 and 63.4, the rules of the classes competing as they apply to that class, except as any of these are changed by the Notice of Race or the Sailing Instructions, and properly posted amendments thereto. The US Sailing Prescriptions are available at www.ussailing.org
- 1.2 If there is a conflict between the Notice of Race and these Sailing Instructions, the Sailing Instructions will take precedence. This changes RRS 63.7.
- 1.3 Each owner/charterer is solely responsible for the safety of his/her boat and the decision whether or not to launch, proceed to the race course, start or continue to race is the owner's/charterer's responsibility and not that of the Lauderdale Yacht Club.

2.0 ENTRIES

2.1 Eligible boats may be entered by completing registration with the Lauderdale Yacht Club Race Committee in accordance with the Notice of Race. Each Class must have a minimum of five entries.

3.0 EQUIPMENT AND INSPECTION

- 3.1 Equipment must conform to the regulations of the class concerned. In addition to any class requirements, all entrants shall carry a tow line of at least 25 feet in length and at least ½ inch in diameter.
- 3.2 Conformance to these equipment standards or inspection of a boat in no way limits or reduces the complete and unlimited responsibility of a boat's skipper for the safety of a boat. The Race Committee reserves the right to inspect entries for eligibility and equipment requirements at any time prior to the awards. Boats which fail to comply with these equipment standards are subject to protest by the Race Committee. If such a protest is sustained, the boat may be disqualified or assessed an appropriate penalty.

4.0 NOTICE TO COMPETITORS

4.1 Notices to competitors will be posted at the Official Regatta Notice Board located at the Lauderdale Yacht Club Pavilion.

5.0 CHANGES IN SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

Any change in the sailing instructions will be posted before 0900 on the day it will take effect. Any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 1900 on the day before it will take effect.

6.0 SIGNALS MADE ASHORE

- 6.1 Signals made ashore will be displayed at the easternmost flagpole of the Lauderdale Yacht Club.
- 6.2 Code flag AP, Answering Pennant, displayed with two accompanying sound signals means the racing is postponed. When AP is lowered with one accompanying sound signal, the time of the warning signal for the next race is posted on the regatta notice board. This changes Race Signals.
- 6.3 Signals applying to the Ocean Course shall be accompanied by a flag with a Laser logo. Signals applying to the Optimist Course shall be accompanied by a flag with an Opti logo

7.0 ORAL INSTRUCTIONS

7.1 Oral instructions may be given by the Race Committee with the following procedure: **DISPLAY** OF **CODE FLAG "L"**. The Race Committee boat will display code flag L and all competitors will pass astern of the Race Committee Signal Boat on starboard tack to receive the oral instructions.

8.0 RESPONSIBILITY

8.1 After the Signal Boat is on station and before the warning signal for the start of the first race of each day, each boat shall sail on starboard tack past the stern of the Race Committee Signal Boat to check in. The Race Committee will acknowledge each boat by hailing her sail number. Boats failing to check in may be scored DNC.

9.0 SCHEDULE

10.0 RACING AREA

10.1 The Racing Area is the Atlantic Ocean, approximately 1 mile South of Port Everglades

inlet and approximately 1/2 mile offshore.

11.0 COURSES

- 11.1 Courses are shown on the attached course diagrams.
- 11.2 The designation for the course to be raced for each class will be displayed on a course board on the signal boat prior to the warning signal of each race.

12.0 MARKS

Marks are designated on the course diagrams and are as follows: Mark W and L will be large orange inflatable Race Committee marks. Mark Y will be a large yellow inflatable Race Committee mark and will be the windward mark for designated classes. Mark S will be a yellow inflatable Race Committee mark. Mark F will be placed in accordance with the Course Diagram for the course selected.

13.0 START

- 13.1 Class flags for each class racing will be described at the Skipper's Meeting. Multiple classes may be started at the same time.
- 13.2 Races will be started in accordance with Appendix "U" with the Warning Signal made three minutes before the starting signal.
- 13.3 The starting line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the Race Committee Signal Boat at the starboard end and the course side of mark S at the port end.
- 13.4 Boats whose preparatory signal has not been made shall keep clear of the starting area and of all boats whose preparatory signal has been made.
- 13.5 A boat starting later than three minutes after her starting signal will be scored DNS. This changes RRS A4.
- 13.6 There may be multiple sounds before the warning signal.

14.0 SAFETY

- 14.1 Except for brief periods when adding or removing clothing, all sailors must wear adequate personal buoyancy at all times while on the water. Code Flag "Y" will not be displayed. This changes RRS 40.
- 14.2 Boats not leaving the harbor for the day's racing shall inform the Regatta Office prior to the harbor start.
- 14.3 A skipper requesting assistance will attempt to signal by waving one arm over the skipper's head.
- 14.4 A boat that decides not to compete in the race or retires after starting a race shall notify the Race Committee or report to a designated Safety Boat or Safety Ball as soon as

practical. No boat should leave the vicinity of the racing area without communicating with and obtaining permission from the Race Committee.

15.0 CHANGE OF COURSE

15.1 A change of course after the start will be signaled at the mark beginning the leg being changed by a Race Committee Signal Boat that will display code flag "C" with the appropriate Class Flag, the appropriate compass bearing to the new mark position and sound a signal periodically. If no Class Flag is displayed the course change applies to all classes. The change will be signaled before the leading boat has begun the leg, even though the mark may not yet be in position. Any mark to be rounded after rounding the new mark position may be relocated to maintain the original course configuration.

16.0 FINISH

16.1 The finishing line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on a Race Committee Signal Boat and the appropriate mark F in accordance with the course diagram.

17.0 TIME LIMIT

17.1 The time limit will be 75 minutes. Boats failing to finish within 20 minutes after the first boat in her class finishes will be scored DNF. This modifies Rule 35.

18.0 PROTESTS AND REDRESS

- 18.1 Competitors are strongly encouraged to monitor the Official Notice Board for protest and scoring penalty notices. Time limits will be strictly enforced for notices properly posted, and failure to check the board when notice has been properly posted will not be grounds for redress.
- 18.2 The protest time limit is 30 minutes after the docking of the Race Committee finish boat.
- 18.3 A request for redress for a scoring penalty (OCS, ZFP, BFD, UFP) shall be made no later than 30 minutes after the protest time limit when the scoring penalty was posted on the Official Notice Board prior to the protest deadline. This changes RRS 62.2.
- 18.4 Requests for redress relating to a starting penalty must state the procedural error the competitor believes the race committee may have made. Further, the competitor will be expected to establish that he or she started properly. This changes RRS 62.2.
- 18.5 Appendix "T" will apply for this event.
- 18.6 Only the Race Committee or Protest Committee may protest a competitor for violation of SI's 3, 8, 14, and 21, and the Protest Committee may assess a scoring penalty other than disqualification for their violation.

19.0 SCORING

19.1 The Low Point scoring system, RRS Appendix A, will apply modified so that each boat's regatta score will be the total of her race scores, with her worst score discarded if six or more races have been completed. Eight races are scheduled, of which one race shall be completed to constitute a regatta.

20.0 PRIZES


20.1 Race trophies will be awarded for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place in each class (or greater at the discretion of the Lauderdale Yacht Club Race Committee).

21.0 SUPPORT AND SPECTATOR BOATS

- 21.1 Team leaders, coaches and other support personnel shall not be in the racing area from the time of the preparatory signal for the first class to start until all boats have finished or the race committee signals a postponement, general recall or abandonment. The racing area is defined as fifty yards away from the outside of the exterior lay lines of the race course. The penalty for failing to comply with this requirement may be disqualification of all boats associated with the support personnel who do so.
- 21.2 All support and spectator boats must register with the Race Committee prior to the Skipper's Meeting and each will be issued a flag that must be displayed at all times while afloat. It is MANDATORY that all support and spectator boats monitor channel 69 for requests from the Race Committee to assist with fleet safety. Support and spectator boats may enter the race area at the request of the Race Committee or when they deem it necessary to assist a boat in distress. Competitors associated with support and spectator boats who fail to comply with this section may be disqualified from the entire event.
- 21.3 Anchoring of event vessels on Coral Reefs, Hardbottom or Seagrass is prohibited under Florida Law. Offshore spectator, support and/or coach vessels are prohibited from anchoring anywhere in the vicinity of the event.
- 21.4 Special provisions are in effect for the protection of, including but not limited to Manatee, Sea Turtle & Sawfish, as well as critical habitat, including but not limited to Johnson Sea Grass, Staghorn and Elkhorn corals. See attached information for further reference.
- 21.5 Competitors may <u>not</u> drop off or retrieve gear from Race Committee boats. Competitors may drop off trash on Race Committee boats.
