## SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

A boat is not permitted to protest another boat for breaking the Sailing Instructions (SIs) as noted by [NP]. The penalty for breaking these SIs may be less than disqualification at the discretion of the protest committee (PC) as noted by [DP]. This changes Rule 60.1.

#### **1 RULES**

- 1.1 The regatta will be governed by the rules as defined in *The Racing Rules of Sailing* (RRS) and the Prescriptions of US Sailing.
- 1.2 US Sailing Regulation 12.03, Protected Competitions shall apply. See Attachment A.
- 1.3 A two-turns penalty is changed to a one-turn penalty. This modifies RRS 44.1.
- 1.4 RRS 40 is changed so that each competitor shall wear a Nationally approved life jacket that is 100% dependent on foam for flotation and the appropriate size for the sailor, at all times while on the water, except for brief periods while adding or removing clothing. (US Sailing Regulation 10) A violation of this instruction may be protested by race officials or a competitor; however, an inadvertent and momentary breach of this instruction may receive a penalty less than disqualification at the discretion of the PC.
- 1.5 In accordance with rule RRS 64.1, the PC may impose penalties for hearings held under RRS 60.3. Such penalties may range in severity from a reprimand to a dismissal from the regatta.
- 1.6 RRS 77 is changed so that a boat is not required to display national letters, However, competitors shall be required to comply with applicable class sail numbering rules.
- 1.7 In the case of a conflict between the Notice of Race and these Sailing Instructions, the Sailing Instructions and any amendments to them shall apply.

#### 2. RECALL NUMBERS [DP] [NP]

Recall numbers will be the sail number the boat is registered under.

#### 3. NOTICES TO COMPETITORS

- 3.1 Notices to competitors (including protest notifications) will be posted on the official notice board located in the breezeway at USSC.
- 3.2 All questions to the race committee (RC), PC, or OA must be made in writing and will be posted and answered on the official notice board.

#### 4. CHANGES TO SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

- 4.1 Changes to the SIs will be posted no later than 0930 each morning on the day it takes effect, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted no later than 1900 the day before a change will take effect.
- 4.2 Oral changes to the SIs may be given on the water. The RC signal boat shall display code flag "L" and competitors shall approach the signal boat and receive the oral change while code flag "L" is displayed in accordance with RRS 90.2(c).

#### 5. SIGNALS MADE ASHORE

- 5.1 Signals made ashore will be displayed from the USSC flagpole.
- 5.2 Code flag "L", when displayed ashore signifies that a change in the SIs or other notice to competitors has been posted on the official notice board.
- 5.3 When flag "AP" is displayed ashore, the warning signal for the next race will be made not less than 45 minutes after AP is lowered. This changes RRS Race Signals.

#### 6. SAFETY [DP] [NP]

A boat retiring from a race shall notify any RC vessel before leaving the course, or, when that is impossible, the USSC protest desk immediately after arrival ashore.

#### 7. FORMAT OF RACES

The boys, girls and mixed events will be sailed together.

#### 8. SCHEDULE

#### 8.1 Ten (10) races are scheduled

#### 9. CLASS FLAGS

The class flag is as follows:

#### 10. RACING AREA

The racing area will be on Biscayne Bay, due east of the USSC launch ramp, approximately 1/2 NM off shore.

#### 11. THE COURSES

- 11.1 The diagrams in Attachment B show the courses, including the order in which marks are to be passed. All rounding marks shall be left to port, except Marks 4S/4P which are gates.
- 11.2 The RC shall post the course to be sailed on a white board on the signal boat.
- 11.3 If one of the gate marks is missing, the mark in position will be rounded to port.

#### 12. MARKS

#### 13. THE START

- 13.1 Races will be started using RRS 26.
- 13.2 The starting line will be between a staff displaying orange flag on the RC signal and a mark.
- 13.3 In the event a boat(s) breaks RRS 30.4, the RC will display her recall number on a white board on the signal boat. This is a courtesy only and failure of the RC to make this posting shall not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS 30.4.
- 13.4 In addition, the RC will attempt to post a boat's recall number on a white board on the signal boat in the event they are scored as OCS or UFD. This is a courtesy only and failure of the RC to make this posting shall not be grounds for redress.
- 13.5 A boat starting later than four (4) minutes after her starting signal will be scored DNS. This changes RRS 35 and A5.

#### 14. COURSE CHANGES

- 14.1 To change the next leg of the course, the RC will (a) move the weather mark, (b) move the finishing line, or (c) move the leeward gate (all original marks).
- 14.2 The RC may make minor adjustments in the course without signaling a change of course. This changes RRS 33.

#### 15. THE FINISH

15.1 The finishing line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the finish line boat and a nearby mark as described in SI 12 and as shown in Attachment B.

#### 16. TIME LIMITS (minutes)

- 16.1 If no boat has passed Mark 1 within the Mark 1 Time Limit, the race shall be abandoned.
- 16.2 Boats still racing and failing to finish within 10 minutes after the first boat in their class sails the course and finishes will be scored DNF and will be scored 2 more points than the last finisher in that race. This changes RRS 35, A4.2, A5 and A11.

#### 17. PROTESTS AND REQUESTS FOR REDRESS

- 17.1 Protest forms will be available at the protest desk at USSC in the breezeway.
- 17.2 The protest time limit is forty-five (45) minutes after the RC Signal boat docks.
- 17.3 The protest hearing schedule and the location of the hearings will be posted on the official notice board no later than 15 minutes after the protest time limit.
- 17.4 Notice of actions taken by the RC (shown in the posted results) or PC will be posted on the official notice board.
- 17.5 On the last day of the regatta, a request for redress of a PC decision or scoring error shall be delivered within the protest time limit or within 30 minutes of the decision or results being posted, whichever is later. This changes RRS 62.2.

#### **18. SCORING**

- 18.1 Three (3) races are required to be completed to constitute a series.
- 18.2 The Low Point System of Appendix A will apply with the following changes:When six (6) or more races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst score.

#### 19. REPLACEMENT OF CREW OR EQUIPMENT [DP]

Substitution of competitors, or repair or replacement of hulls, sails, or equipment will not be allowed without prior written approval of the RC.

#### 20. SUPPORT PERSONS & SPECTATORS

- a) All support persons and spectators intending to operate boats near the racing venue must register with the OA, at which time they shall provide boat registration/documentation and proof of insurance information for the boat(s) they intend to use.
- b) All support persons and spectator boats shall provide their own VHF radio and monitor a VHF channel designated by the OA to receive instructions from the OA while near the racing venue. All such boats shall additionally function as Safety Boats and follow instructions from the OA.
- c) Failure to register, failure to monitor the designated VHF channel, or failure to abide by instruction may result in operating restrictions being placed up on the support person, spectator, or their boat(s) during the regatta.

#### 21. DISPOSAL OF TRASH [DP]

Boats shall not purposefully discharge trash into the water.

#### 22. ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION [DP]

A competitor shall not send or receive electronic communications from the time he or she leaves the dock until after the last race of the day.

#### 23. PRIZES

- 23.1 Prizes will be awarded to first through third place. Additional awards may be presented.
- 24.2 U.S. Competitors who are under the age of 19 years on 31 December 2018 (Born after 31 December 1999) may be eligible to qualify for the US Youth World Team

to compete at the 2018 World Sailing Youth World Championships. See http://www.ussailing.org/olympics/selection/youth-worlds/

24.3 Additional US Youth World Team Representatives may be decided according to US Sailing Regulation 12.01

#### 25. RISK, DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY & PERSONAL CONDUCT

- 25.1 Competitors participate in the regatta at their own risk. See RRS 4 (Decision to Race). The OA will not accept any liability for material damage or personal injury or death sustained in conjunction with or prior to, during, or after the regatta.
- 25.2 The competitor will accept full responsibility for all his/her actions during any activity related to the event. This includes on-shore activities before, during, and after the regatta.
- 25.3 All competitors are expected to maintain the highest levels of conduct throughout the entire event. Enforcement of discipline and conduct shall be conducted as per RRS 69.1, the Championships' Code of Conduct and/or the policies and procedures of US Sailing (Regulation 15.01).

## **ATTACHMENT A**

#### PROCEDURES FOR PROTECTED COMPETITIONS

US Sailing Regulation 12.03 Protected Competitions will be in effect for this event. The following rules and procedures will apply:

a) The US Sailing prescriptions to RRS 60, 63.2, and 63.4 shall apply to a Protected Competition, except that the words "when practicable" in the first sentence of the prescription to RRS 63.4 are deleted.

b) Protest committees shall include 20% "sailor-athlete" representation. "Sailor-athlete" has the meaning of "athlete" set forth in USOC Bylaw, Section 8.8.2 (the 10-year rule) or Level A or B Sailor-Athlete as defined by US Sailing Sailor Athlete Council (SAC) Bylaws 3.3.1 and 3.3.2 (except that the US Sailing member class referred to in SAC Bylaw 3.3.2.3 shall be an international class recognized by World Sailing at the time of the sailor-athlete's qualification).

c) The right of appeal will not be denied under RRS 70.5 (a), (b), or (c), but an expedited appeal process may be used that balances the needs of the competitor for certainty with respect to berths in future competitions and sufficient time to prepare the arguments and evidence for the appeal.

d) Any boat that is a party to a redress hearing may be represented by up to two individuals. This changes RRS 63.3(a).

e) If a hearing is scheduled after the event is concluded and after the sailors and officials have left the venue, it will be scheduled as soon as possible, and in a place and manner chosen with deference to the

competitor's preferences or circumstances; and parties to the hearing have the right to be present telephonically or via video feed as appropriate, provided all participants can hear and speak to each other.
