Sailing Instructions Mesick Race

Sunday, July 31, 2022 Organizing Authority: Hawaii Yacht Club (HYC)

1. RULES

The race will be conducted according to *The Racing Rules of Sailing 2021-2024* [RRS], US Sailing Prescriptions, Hawaii Yacht Racing Association [HYRA] Prescriptions and HYC Standing Rules for Offshore Races unless otherwise amended in the Notice of Race or these Sailing Instructions.

2. Classes

Boats will be entered into classes according to their NCPHRF ratings as outlined by HYRA. C class boats will be scored together and are limited to Dacron sails only, main and single jib.

3. NOTICES TO COMPETITORS

Notices to competitors will be posted on the official notice board located at Hawaii Yacht Club [HYC] or on the Main Race Committee Boat.

4. CHANGES TO THE SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

Any changes to the Sailing Instructions will be posted on the HYC official notice board by 0830 on the day they will take effect as well as on RegattaNetwork.

5. CODE OF CONDUCT

HYC's Sailing Program operates on the basic value of the Corinthian Spirit.

- Corinthian values are our core. We are grounded in families, friendships, comradery and sportsmanship. This spirit permeates all that HYC does.
- Sportsmanship is of PRIME emphasis to the members and leadership of HYC. It is part of our innate value system. Nothing other than full compliance is the expectation. No tolerance for bad behavior will be accepted. HYC has exemplified a centuries-long set of values and performance. There is no compromise.
- The Corinthian Spirit of sailing is based on the excitement of a common goal to have *fun* during the thrill of competition.
- While good sportsmanship may be something largely recognized on the water, it extends well beyond competitive activities. It forms a central part of our life as a Club and is the guidance for our equilibration of matter what the activity.
- Good sportsmanship is paramount before we hit the water, while on the water and after being on the water.

• The purpose of *The Racing Rules of Sailing* is to keep sailors and boats safe and to provide fair competition. The rules are governed by two basic principles:

Sportsmanship and the Rules - Competitors in the sport of sailing are governed by a body of rules that they are expected to follow and enforce. A fundamental principle of sportsmanship is that when competitors break a rule they will promptly take a penalty, which may be to retire.

Environmental Responsibility -Participants are encouraged to minimize any adverse environmental impact of the sport of sailing.

• Violations of the HYC Sailing Program Code of Conduct or RRS 69.1(a), or allegations of such, will be resolved in accordance with the provisions of RRS 69 and/or the HYC the by-laws, rules, procedures and guidelines.

5. SIGNALS MADE ASHORE

Signals made ashore will be displayed at the HYC flagpole.

6. SCHEDULE OF STARTS

- **6.1** Dates of Racing: All classes will race on Sunday, July 31, 2022.
- **6.2** Number of Races: One race will be sailed for each class.
- **6.3** The scheduled time of the first warning signal is 1055 hours for all classes:
- **6.4** All boats must check in with Race Committee on Ch 68 prior to the first start sequence.

7. CLASS FLAGS CLASS FLAG X/A Pink with "X" B/C Blue with "B"

8. RACING AREA

The regatta will be held on the waters between Waikiki and Kokohead.

9. RACE Q's

Race Q's on and live.

10. <u>THE COURSE</u> A (long) Start – pass DH(p) – round M1(p) – pass DH(s) - round G1(s) Finish. Course length is approximately 16.5 nm. The use of course A or B for the race will be announced at the skipper's meeting.

B (short) Start – pass DH(p) – round G1(s) Finish. Course length is approximately 11 nm. The use of course A or B for the race will be announced at the skipper's meeting.

11. **MARKS**

11.1. Course A (long)

- 11.1.a. "DH" is the red Diamond Head buoy.
- 11.1.b. "M1" is an inflatable orange tetrahedron. The approximate GPS coordinates for M1 will be 21° 15.690' N, 157° 45.527' W or within 2 nm of those GPS coordinates.
- **11.1.c.** "G1" is the green Kalihi Channel entrance buoy (Ke'ehi Lagoon).
- **11.1.d.** The starting mark will be between an orange inflatable buoy and the Race Committee Boat. Instruction 11.2 will describe the starting line.
- **11.1.e.** The finishing mark will be between an orange inflatable buoy and the Race Committee Boat. Instruction 12.1 will describe the starting line.
- **11.1.f.** R2 will be used as a starting or finishing mark in the absence of an orange inflatable buoy.

12. THE START

- **12.1.** The starting sequence will conform to RRS 26.
- **12.2.** The starting line will be between the orange inflatable buoy on the port end and the staff of an orange flag on the Main Race Committee Boat on the starboard end.
- **12.3.** Boats starting later than 10 minutes after the last starting signal for their class will be scored Did Not Start without a hearing. This changes RRS A4 and A5.

13. THE FINISH

13.1. The finish line will be between an orange inflatable buoy on the starboard end and the staff of an orange flag on the Main Race Committee Boat on the port end.

14. PENALTY SYSTEM

Yachts that take a penalty or retire under RRS 44.1 shall file a written acknowledgement with the race committee prior to the protest time limit.

15. TIME LIMITS

- **15.1** If the first boat to reach DH does not do so within two hours of the start time the race will be postponed.
- 15.2 There is no time limit for finishing the race.

16. PROTESTS AND REQUESTS FOR REDRESS

- **16.1.** Protest forms are available from the race committee or on the HYC official bulletin board. Protests and requests for redress shall be delivered to the race committee within the appropriate time limit.
- **16.2.** The protest time limit is 90 minutes after the last boat in the race has finished.
- **16.3.** Notices will be posted within 30 minutes of the protest time limit to inform competitors of the time and location of hearings in which they are parties or named as witnesses.
- **16.4.** Notices of protests by the race committee or the protest committee will be posted to inform boats under RRS 61.1(b).
- **16.5.** A list of boats that, under instruction 13, have acknowledged taking a penalty or retiring, will be posted before the protest time limit.

17. ARBITRATION

Arbitration will be offered as described in the Standing Sailing Instructions.

18. SCORING

- **18.1.** The low point system of Appendix A will apply as modified in the Standing Sailing Instructions.
- **18.2.** In the event of a tie, RRS A7 will apply.
- **18.3.** The PHRF handicap system will be in effect for all boats. Race handicaps will be calculated using the Time-on-Time method as adopted by HYRA.

19. SAFETY REGULATIONS

- **19.1. VHF Channel 68** is reserved for essential communications, otherwise yachts shall monitor VHF Channel 16.
- **19.2.** Upon withdrawing from the race, yachts shall inform the race committee via **VHF Channel 68**, by voice hail, or by calling the principal race officer Lynn Silva (808)258-8199. Failure to do so may result in denied entry to future races.

20. PRIZES

For each class, 1st prize will be awarded if three or more boats enter, 2nd prize will be awarded if five or more boats enter, and 3rd prize will be awarded if seven or more boats enter.

21. DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY

Competitors participate in the regatta entirely at their own risk. See RRS 4, Decision to Race. The organizing authority will not accept any liability for material damage or personal injury or death sustained in conjunction with or prior to, during, or after the race.

22. INSURANCE

Each participating boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of \$500,000 per event or the equivalent.
