Sailing Instructions

1. RULES

- 1.1 <u>Local Advisory</u>: All competitors are asked to observe USCG Navigational Rule 9, which in part reads, "A vessel shall not cross a narrow channel or fairway if such crossing impedes the passage of a vessel which can safely navigate only within such channel or fairway." RRS 60.2, 63.1, and A5 are modified to add that the Race Committee (RC) may disqualify a boat infringing this instruction without a hearing.
- 1.2 [DP] NAVAL and CRUISE SHIP PROTECTION ZONE: A naval protection zone exists in a radius of 500 yards (<u>CFR 165.2015</u>) around U.S. naval vessels greater than 100 feet in length, except when the large naval vessel is moored or anchored within a restricted area. All vessels within a naval vessel protection zone shall operate at the minimum speed necessary to maintain a safe course and shall proceed as directed by an official patrol, and when within such zone, no vessel is allowed within 100 yards of a large U.S. naval vessel (<u>CFR 165.2030</u>). No vessel is allowed within 100 yards of a cruise ship (<u>CFR 165.1108</u>).
- 1.3 Entry into the NAS North Island Security Zones 100 yards around Pier Bravo and vessels moored to it (<u>CFR 165.1105</u>) and the aircraft carrier turning basin (<u>CFR 165.1104</u>) is prohibited.
- 1.4 Per RRS 42.3(i), competitors may use an engine or other propulsion method to avoid situations in SI 1.1 or 1.2, provided they gain no significant advantage in the race.
- 1.5 Add new rule 41(e): (e) help to recover from the water and return on board a crew member, provided the return on board is at the approximate location of the recovery.
- 1.6 If the Race Committee boat is damaged because of a boat breaking a rule, that boat shall be responsible for the repairs.

2. CHANGES TO SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

- 2.1 Any change to the sailing instructions will be posted before 0900 on the day it will take effect, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 2000 on the day before it will take effect.
- 2.2 In accordance with RRS 90.2 (c), oral changes to the Sailing Instructions may be made on the water. A change is in effect when the Race Committee (RC) signal boat displays Flag **L** over **A** with one sound signal. This means come within hail of the RC boat to receive the oral changes to the Sailing Instructions.

3. COMMUNICATIONS WITH COMPETITORS

- 3.1 Official notices and amendments will be available online through the <u>EVENT NOTICE BOARD</u> on this event's page on the <u>SWYC</u> website.
- 3.2 On the water, the RC will monitor and communicate with competitors on VHF radio channel 68. Please contact them to notify of a boat's intent to withdraw from racing per SI 13.2.
- **3.3** In the event of an on-the-water emergency, first contact the US Coast Guard on VHF Channel 16 directly and immediately, then contact the RC.

4. CODE OF CONDUCT

4.1 [DP] Competitors and support persons shall comply with reasonable requests from race officials.

5. SCHEDULE OF RACES

- 5.1 The race is scheduled for Saturday, July 22, 2023.
- 5.2 The first warning is scheduled for 1155.

6. CLASS FLAGS & CHECK IN

- 6.1 [DP]Boats shall check in with the RC signal boat prior to the first warning signal. Boats checking in shall pass the RC boat to starboard and hail with sail number and class. Check-in will be complete only when the RC boat responds with that information. *There will be no radio check-in.*
- 6.2 Each boat must check in before 1155 <u>or</u> at least 15 minutes before its assigned starting time.
- 6.3 Class pennants will be as follows:

6.4 The *Current Registrants* list on the <u>regatta website</u> shows boats in their official class assignments.

7. RACING AREA

- 7.1 The racing area will be in San Diego Bay.
- 7.2 The starting area will be in the vicinity of San Diego Bay Buoy 19.

8. THE COURSES

- 8.1 Each boat will decide its start direction and sequence of marks.
- 8.2 Each boat shall determine which way to round a mark before entering the three-length zone of that mark. Once there, the mark then has a required side for the application of RRS 18.
- 8.3 The RC will select one of the following courses, and, prior to the first warning signal, will announce the course by displaying the corresponding numeral code flag. As a courtesy, the RC may also announce the course via VHF channel 68.

- 8.4 Each boat must cross the starting line in the direction of their first mark, in accordance with the *RRS* definition of *start*.
- 8.5 Each boat must pass north of FM19 when rounding that mark, in accordance with *RRS 28*.
- 8.6 Each boat must cross the finishing line from the course side, in accordance with the *RRS* definition of *finish*.

9. MARKS

- 9.1 The starting and the finishing marks are the RC boat and Buoy 19.
- 9.2 Navy Mooring FM19 is located near the east end of Harbor Island at approx. 32° 43.27′ N, 117° 11.415′ W.
- 9.3 The "Bridge" is defined as any of Piers 18, 19, or 20 of the Coronado Bridge.
- 9.4 San Diego channel Buoys 12, 15, 16A, 17, 23 and 24 may also be used as marks.

10. THE START

- 10.1 There will be a staggered (pursuit) start with a modified starting sequence defined below. This changes RRS rule 26. Starting times will be posted as an amendment to the SIs.
- 10.2 The starting line is between the course side of Buoy 19 and a staff displaying an orange flag on the RC boat.
- 10.3 A distance buoy may be streamed aft of the RC boat and, if present, will be considered part of the RC boat.
- 10.4 After the first warning signal, each boat **shall stay at least 50 yards away from the starting line** (North and South sides) until 4 minutes before her starting signal.
- 10.5 The RC may postpone the race per RRS rule 27.3. In the event of postponement, the RC will announce the amount of delay, which will be a multiple of 10 minutes. Each boat is expected to add the announced delay amount to her published starting time.
- 10.6 **RRS 30.1 (I flag) will be in effect for all starts.** *If flag I has been displayed, and any part of a boat's hull is on the course side of the starting line or one of its extensions during the last minute before her starting signal, she shall sail across an extension so that her hull is completely on the pre-start side before she starts.*
- 10.7 The following table defines the first starting sequence and associated signals. RC will synchronize with GPS time.

Signal	Time	Flag and Sound
Attention	1154	4 horns
Warning	1155	Multicolored flag and one horn
Preparatory	1156	I flag and one horn
One-Minute	1159	I flag removed and one long horn
First starting signal	1200	Multicolored flag removed and one horn
Subsequent starting time	Various	One whistle
Courtesy time-checks	1215,1230,1245, etc.	One horn

*** CAUTION ***

Watch out for yachts starting in the opposite direction!

- 10.8 For each subsequent boat starting, the RC will sound a whistle at the boat's assigned starting time.
- 10.9 The RC will sound one horn for courtesy time-checks at 1215, 1230, and 1245.
- 10.10 The absence of a sound signal will be disregarded. Failure of the RC to make a sound or to time it accurately will not be grounds for a request for redress. This changes RRS rule 62.1(a).
- 10.11 Individual warning, preparatory, and one-minute signals will not be given. A boat's starting signal is at her assigned starting time, and she is *racing* 4 minutes prior to her starting signal.

11. RECALLS

11.1 As a courtesy, the RC will announce individual recalls on VHF channel 68 but will NOT display Flag X and will NOT sound a horn. Failure of a yacht to hear a hail or failure of the RC to hail shall not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS rules 29.1 and 62.1(a).

12. THE FINISH

12.1 The finishing line is between the course side of Buoy 19 and a staff displaying a blue flag on the RC boat.

*** CAUTION ***

WATCH OUT FOR YACHTS FINISHING IN THE OPPOSITE DIRECTION!

13. TIME LIMIT & WITHDRAWLS

- 13.1 Boats failing to finish by 1600 will be scored as DNF without a hearing. This changes RRS rules 35, A4, and A5.
- 13.2 A boat that retires from the race must notify the RC before leaving the course. Failure to notify the RC may result in possible loss of racing privileges in future SWYC events.

14. HEARING REQUESTS

- 14.1 Protests shall be initiated in compliance with RRS 61, except as amended by these Sailing Instructions.
- 14.2 RRS 61 is modified to add the additional requirement: A boat intending to protest shall report her intentions and the boat(s) being protested to the RC on station upon finishing or retiring and shall obtain RC acknowledgement. A boat that does not finish and

intends to protest may report her intentions and the boat(s) being protested to the RC via VHF Channel 68 and shall obtain RC acknowledgement.

- 14.3 The protest time limit expires 60 minutes after the protesting boat's finish.
- 14.4 Written protests may be filed electronically or in person. Protests filed electronically may be sent to Charles Campbell, SWYC Protest Chair, at <u>protests@southwesternyc.org</u>. The US Sailing app is an excellent tool for this purpose. Protests may also be filed in person or electronically to any member of the SWYC Race Committee. Protests may also be brought to the RC at the after-race party.
- 14.5 Notice of protests and boats involved, and the schedule of hearings will be posted on the online event.
- 14.6 Protests will be heard in the approximate order of receipt as soon as possible after the day's racing is complete, or later, at the option of the Protest Committee.

15. PRIZES

- 15.1 The number of prizes awarded in each class will be based on the number of entries.
- 15.2 The Overall Open Spinnaker Winner and the SWRF Winner will be noted on the perpetual trophy.
